Karl: Yes. We look after hundreds of passengers, so we work really quickly but also make sure everyone gets what they need. I still find that hard, but when things go wrong, I know how to deal with them – that's my best quality, actually. The other thing is we need to listen and talk to passengers a lot, and I don't find that easy because I'm shy.

Woman: People think flight attendants have exciting lives. Are they right?

Karl: In some ways, yes. I've been to 30 different countries – and that's not unusual. Some people imagine we get paid a lot, though, and that's definitely not true. But most of us enjoy our jobs. When you see flight attendants smiling and joking as they're serving food, they're not acting – they really do feel happy.

Karl: I see my family and friends – it's easy to lose touch if you're away a lot. It's also important to get plenty of sleep and exercise because you need to be healthy to do this job.
