solenoid /'soʊ-lə,nɔɪd, 'sdı-ə-/ n [C] **physics** a device consisting of a wire wrapped in the shape of a cylinder, which acts like a magnet when electricity goes through it

solid FIRM/NOT LIQUID /'sal·əd/ adj 1 having a fixed shape that cannot be changed easily O After flying all night, he was glad to be on solid ground. 2 **chemistry** A substance that is solid is not a liquid or a gas.

solid /'sal·əd/ n [C] **geometry** an object with three DIMENSIONS (= height, width, and length) \circ A cube is a solid. \circ After the operation, Mrs. Groncki couldn't eat solids (= food that is not liquid).
