Volcanoes FAQs

Santorini (Greece, 1630 BC) and Krakatoa (Indonesia, 1883) are probably the best known. When these volcanic islands exploded, they created huge waves of hot gas and rock and giant tsunamis. But the 1815 eruption of Mount Tambora in Indonesia was worse. 160km³ of volcanic material shot into the air, and the whole mountain was described as 'a mass of liquid fire'. Ash covered the land for hundreds of kilometres and hid the sun. Across the world, the temperature dropped and 1816 was called 'the year without a summer'. About 72,000 people died, many of them from hunger, as a result of this eruption.

Yes, Tambora, Santorini and Krakatoa are all still active. In fact Krakatoa is pushing up a new volcanic island, called Anak Krakatoa (Child of Krakatoa), which is growing fast. Experts say that all three volcanoes will definitely produce big eruptions again — but they won't happen soon.

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Nobody knows. The greatest danger will probably come from the area around the Pacific Ocean, called the Pacific Ring of Fire, where most of the world's active volcanoes are found. Some, like Popocatépetl in Mexico, are close to big cities, while others, like Merapi in Indonesia, are extremely active and have already caused recent disasters. Volcanologists are carefully watching many of the volcanoes in this region.

They find out how often earthquakes take place and look for changes in the shape of the mountain. They also check for increases in temperature and changes in the gases coming out. These can be signs that the volcano is going to erupt. But it is impossible to predict exactly where or when an eruption will happen or how large it will be.






