

The Inland parts of Lancashire and Yorkshire being favourd with great variety of valuable Manufactures in Woollen Linnen Cotton & and that in very great quantities; has made that Neighbourhood as populous if not more so [London & Middlefex excepted] as the same extent of any part of Great Brittain: The Trades of these Counties extend consider: ably through the whole Itland, as well as abroad, and the confumption of Groceries, Irish-Wool. Dying Stuff & other Imported goods consequently very great; but as yet not tavourd with the Conveniency of Water Carriage, the Providence from the Port of Lever: pool up to the most considerable Inland Town of Trade in Lancashire, Manchester, has afforded the Beft, not yet employed Rivers of Merfey & Irwell for that purpose. Those Rivers are here deferibed from Bank-key (whither from Leverpool y Navigation at prefent is used) The conveniencies of the Navigation carried thence to Manchester, might one time or other be of the greatest Importance in time of War, in Joyning a communica = tion of the East and West Seas of Great Britain with only 28 Miles of Land Carrage . The Trade made more eafey, by an expensive Land Carriage cause in a deep and Hat Country) being turned into an eafy and cheap Water-carriage and Cheshire ferved with Coals, Flaggs & Slate far cheaper than at Prefent &?
